From the Pastor's Desk

“Eureka!”

“Oh! That’s it!”

“I see it now.”

“I get it!”

“There’s a way!”

Epiphany!

As a camp counselor there were moments in between the schedule of the day, like waiting for lunch, or if you finished an activity early, that we would need to fill some time. With the younger kids this usually meant singing a silly song or making a bracelet. With the older kids, one of our favorite time-fillers was what we called “five minute mysteries.” These were little riddles where a counselor would describe a situation and the campers would ask yes-or-no questions to arrive at a conclusion. One of my standards went something like this:

Every day, Mr. Thompson wakes up on the 25th floor of his building where he lives, walks to the elevator, presses the lobby button, takes it down, and goes to work. Then after he returns home at the end of the day, he goes into the elevator, presses the button for floor 23, gets off at that floor, and takes the stairs the rest of the way to floor 25, where he lives. Why does he do this?

One of the great joys of life is noticing when one of the campers arrived at the correct solution. The look of relief and amazement at that moment of epiphany was such a joy to be a part of. Any good teacher I’ve ever met can give you a similar story of recognizing epiphanies when their student “gets it.”

Epiphany means a sudden realization, and it can also mean “to show, to appear, to be revealed.” This is true for answers and solutions that can suddenly seem so obvious. It was also true for the Magi who saw the sudden revealing of a new star in the sky, a new light giving clarity in pointing to the true light that had appeared in the world when Christ was born. And it is true for us each year as we celebrate Jesus’ birth on Christmas Eve, but even more importantly when we take that revelatory joy with us into the new year. In the time of year when we have the least sunlight, it is often the light of Christ that gives us the hope to continue.

This January, I pray that we may keep our eyes and minds open to what is being revealed, even in difficult times: that faith, hope, and love abide; that the true light of Christ continues to shine; that Emmanuel, God with us, was born in Bethlehem and his light continues to shine in, through, and all around us.

May we celebrate the little epiphanies every time we get them!

Altar Guild Notes: January, 2026

January. Shiny new calendars await in our home and workplaces.

Ready for us to note events and obligations of the new year.

But we have one more Sunday in the Christmas season and one more festival to celebrate before anything changes in church!

Enjoy the trees & poinsettias another week!

The Feast of Epiphany of our Lord, January 6th, concludes the Christmas season. The Magi have arrived by following a star!

Jesus' divine nature is revealed.

They worship Jesus with gifts symbolizing His kingship (gold), divinity (frankincense), and future sacrifice (myrrh).

Powerful. Insightful. These wise men will now spread the "Good News" to proclaim Jesus' glory to

all nations. The three kings with their gifts are depicted on the pulpit frontal following the star towards the nativity scene on the altar frontal.



The second Sunday seems subdued as all the decorations are gone. The paraments have changed, but another white set is in place.

We skip a few years ahead in Jesus' life to celebrate Baptism of our Lord. Adult Jesus is baptized in the River Jordan by John the Baptist. There, an even bigger public revelation; God proclaims Jesus His beloved son and anoints Him with the Holy Spirit (descending dove). Jesus goes on from there with His followers, made manifest to be a light for the nations.

Time after Epiphany continues for the last two Sundays this month. It is the short green season. We listen as the light of Christ is revealed in stories of Jesus' public ministry. Our green paraments signify this season.

As His followers, it is our turn to leave church every Sunday prepared to bring Christ light to the world.

An Epiphany Blessing of the Home

Epiphany tradition can include the blessing of the home for the new year. Use chalk to mark the outside lintel (molding above) your front door: 20+C+M+B+26. The CMB stands for *Christus mansionem benedicat*, “May Christ bless this home”. Some say that the CMB stands for the names of the Magi: Casper, Melchior, Balthazar. Process through every room bearing a candle. Then use them for your New Years Day dinner!

Here is a prayer you can use when you mark your door: O God, the One and Eternal Light, You guided the Magi to Your Son from afar and revealed Him to them as King of Kings. And they, believing, paid Him homage and offered gifts. Be pleased to impart your blessing upon this home, as we indeed accept the light of your revelation in our home. Grant that our home may be a place of acceptance to all, and that we might more perfectly reflect Your light to the world. Grant this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Messages From the Co-Presidents

Years ago, I remember Pastor Scarafia would urge us to remember, “Advent is more about preparing your heart for Christmas, than preparing your house.”

Preparation, good news, expectation, joy
yes to the manger
yes to love enfleshed
yes to the one incarnate for others
yes to the wholeness of God

In expectation.

These were the words beginning this year’s preparation of Advent. How amazing, we would meet the newest member of our congregation, Rozelle Justice Auwae, daughter of Romeo and Raquel, baptized on December 7, preparing her for life! That day we sang of justice, and read in our Psalm of “You who alone do wondrous deeds.” That was also the day I met Ben and Serenity, two young people visiting with us, yearning for words of love and encouragement, reaching out for community. I believe this is a common theme in our world today. As our Advent continued, Pastor asked us “where do we put our attention?” Are we open to hearing the voice of God, do we consider how we use our gifts. Do we pay too much attention to the wrong gifts at Christmas?

Then, for me came one of the highlights of the Season. The children’s Once Upon a Manger” Paper Bag Pageant. Illness left us with fewer children than expected, which was a “gift” for all of us, as we were not only allowed to, but required to find the child in all of us! The birth of the Christ Child celebrated with amazing joy, loud laughter, inclusion of all creatures, younger and less young. Indeed, celebrating THE gift for all of us. Celebrating the Christ Child with a “moo, oink, baa.” And on Christmas Eve, we heard again, and again, the persistent, piercing truth of faith. God always shows up... looking not for the “house in order,” but the open heart.

My brother's favorite song was In The Bleak Midwinter. I remember always thinking this lyric and tune from the late 1800's sounded so somber, almost minor in tone.... until I heard my brother sing it at a Christmas Eve Service when I was in high school. It was so soft and tender, so sincere and every word came from his heart. Nothing had changed, but me. When we sang it this Christmas Eve, I was thinking, what can I give Him, give my heart. God Bless us, everyone.

Worship Information

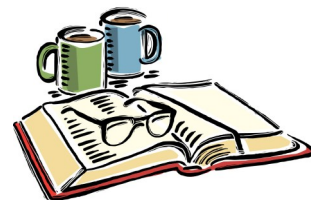

- ◇ When in need of pastoral services such as baptisms, weddings, home communion, funeral, or memorial services.
- ◇ In any other circumstance where pastoral care may benefit you. When in doubt, call.
