From the Pastor's Desk

Happy New Year!

Yes, you read that correctly. The Christian liturgical year begins with Advent, a time of preparation, of getting ready for Christ, and of waiting. How does your understanding of December change if you view it as the start of the year, as opposed to the end of the year?

The season of Advent is not what we expect, if we are paying attention to how television, marketing, and our culture talk about December. In popular culture in the US, December is all about getting ready for Christmas and buying presents. Yet in the church, Advent is about getting ready for Jesus to come into the world as a baby, but also preparing our selves for Jesus' return and Christ's presence with us now. What if we used December not as a time to get ready for presents, but as a time to get our hearts re-oriented to Christ for another year?

The new year starts for Christians on the first Sunday in Advent, November 30th. As you prepare for celebrations with family and friends, this year, let's also prepare ourselves for Christ's return. Not just as a baby 2000 years ago, but also in our neighbors today. I pray that we see in the newborns born this month, the face of Christ. I pray that in our new neighbors we meet from near and far we see the face of Jesus, who travelled all the way to Egypt and back to escape the tyranny of a leader who wanted to retain power at all costs. May we see in our neighbors a gift worthy of honoring, as precious as any perfume, spice, or gold. Women of the ELCA Conference Report

This is my report of the Upstate New York Synod 2025 Convention.

We met at Notre Dame Retreat Center, Canandaigua, NY. The theme for the Convention was "The Path to Peace and Healing." Each day, there were 40 women present. Myrna Wells Ulland, Executive Board President, Women of the ELCA, was our Keynote Speaker. Our Chaplain was Pastor Aileen Robbins, who lives in Rochester and is serving two congregations, St. Paul's, Penn Yan and Messiah, Rochester. Both were well informed about WELCA and shared their information.

One area discussed was that a short-term appeal has been launched to close last year's \$250,000 funding gap. We are encouraged to "SALT" our offering between now and Jan 3, 2026. "Salt" is "Share Abundance, Love, and Thanks."

"The Path to Peace and Healing" was the theme for the weekend. We learned about how the women from Indigenous Communities have gone missing or been murdered without any resolution to their cases in New York as well as other states.

Saturday morning some of us met outside for Morning Prayer. While facing the rising sun, we used the Cherokee Morning Song to welcome the New Day. "Awen" (I am) "De" (of) "Yauh" (the Great Spirit) "HO" (it is so). During Sunday worship, we used a Native American version of the Twenty-Third Psalm.

On Saturday afternoon, a group of us took a side trip to Ganondagan State Historic Site. We enjoyed seeing the "Full-size" Seneca Bark Longhouse built in 1998. We also explored the grounds.

We had time each day to socialize with each other. There were crafts we could do, including puzzles. Also we had time for singing and just visiting.

On Sunday morning, we had a closing worship service. I did not attend any of the Business Meetings.


