

From the Pastor's Desk

"The thing about walking is that it's not eventful." – Bill Bryson

When's the last time you went for a nice walk? Maybe around the neighborhood, maybe through the woods a bit, maybe on a big hike? When we say, "I'm going to go for a walk," sometimes it's for exercise, but often it's a way to just get outside and get some fresh air. Most of the time, like Bill Bryson who hiked much of the Appalachian trail and wrote a book about it, walking is uneventful. Yet it is something that we value, and that we know is good for us. We get outside, feel the sun, or the wind, smell the air, hear the birds. Going for a walk may not always be eventful, but it is good.

When I go for a walk I am reminded of how nature works, and that we are a part of God's good creation. The insects nurture the plants which flower and fruit, and the fruit feeds animals and people alike. Going for a walk also gives me a chance to think, and often clear my head, or put things in perspective. An uneventful walk can allow us to see that some things we worry about aren't as dire as we may think they are.

Jesus had something to say about getting outside and noticing creation in Matthew 6:

'Look at the birds in the sky. They don't sow seed or harvest grain or gather crops into barns. Yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Aren't you worth much more than they are? Who among you by worrying can add a single moment to your life? And why do you worry about clothes? Notice how the lilies in the field grow. They don't wear themselves out with work, and they don't spin cloth. But I say to you that even Solomon in all of his splendor wasn't dressed like one of these. If God dresses grass in the field so beautifully, even though it's alive today and tomorrow it's thrown into the furnace, won't God do much more for you, you people of weak faith? Therefore, don't worry and say, 'What are we going to eat?' or 'What are we going to drink?' or 'What are we going to wear?' Gentiles long for all these things. Your heavenly Father knows that you need them. Instead, desire first and foremost God's kingdom and God's righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well. Therefore, stop worrying about tomorrow, because tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own."

This July and August, I pray that you will be able to get some moments to go for walk, or to sit outside in a comfortable chair, or an uncomfortable bench of log, and notice creation. Take time to have uneventful time. Take time to rest, have sabbath, and realize that you are a part of God's good creation. And know that God loves you, and God's got you, just like the birds and the lilies.

Altar Guild Notes: July / August, 2023

The season of Time after Pentecost continues for all of July and August. Green paraments, chalice veil, banner are used to symbolize this time in the liturgical year.

Symbols are an important part of our worship life. Symbols have no power of their own. Christian symbols derive from scripture and point us to God's truth. They remind us of who we are and Whose we are.



The four plaques on the wall near the pulpit have powerful symbols to contemplate before worship begins. The top one is the eye of God, light and life emanating from the center: Our all seeing, omnipotent God, creator of all. The next one under is the Lamb of God (Agnus Dei): Jesus, our sacrificial lamb that laid down His life for us. He bears a flag, victory over death for us! Under that is the descending dove, the Holy Spirit. We recently celebrated Pentecost. The Holy Spirit is sent to be with us, our guide and advocate for all time. The last plaque is a ship symbolizing the church. That is us, then and now! Our worship space inside the church building is called a Nave. That word come from the Latin word, navis, which means ship. We are sailing on the waters of our baptism in the ocean of time.

Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Creator, Redeemer, Paraclete, Church. Even the order in which they are presented tells

the story. It also reminds us that we are instructed, equipped with our individual gifts to be sent out from this building to proclaim God's Word. Four works of art to fill our hearts and minds. That's a lot in four little picture icons.

Look up the next time you are sitting in a pew. Notice the curve of the long wood boards. Do you see that you are in a ship?! We worship, are fed by the Eucharist, and sent out to use our gifts to spread the Word. Go with God.





Ride for Roswell

Wow! I would like to thank you all for your contribution to and participation in the first annual St. Timothy Ride for Roswell bike ride! St. Timothy's fund raising will help



advance the critical mission of cancer research here locally. Your contribution adds up with all the others to help fund research and help those today who are dealing with cancer.

Not only does the Ride help fund research, but it serves other purposes. It created a fellowship opportunity for us an organization to get together for an important cause. It allowed us to not only have a great time riding together on the 24th, but to participate in the social aspect of some pre-rides and have fun and food at the Friday "Celebration of Hope" festivities. One of the other benefits is the training for these rides. I set the goal for the distance I am riding and this helps keep me riding a bit further each week which keeps me healthy.

This year, I created the St. Timothy team and recruited 5 new first-time Ride for Roswell riders. Hopefully next year our St. Timothy's team will expand and join me in this fun and meaningful ride. Distances start as low as 5 miles and top at 100, so there is a distance for everyone. They also have many opportunities to volunteer to direct riders or cheer the riders on.

The St. Timothy's Ride for Roswell team raised \$2,325 and our team was 341 out of 809 in fundraising. Each dollar raised turns into 13 with grant money. Roswell raised over 5.6 million in this ride with over 8,000 riders to be used for cancer research. This activity was a nice way to make a difference in our community.

Missions Spotlight

About three hours from Lae, Papua New Guinea, a water project in Sokam village has yielded unexpected and surprising outcomes. The village lacks sufficient water, and though the distance to Lae, the country's second largest town, is not terribly far, rough roads into the mountains make travel and transportation difficult.

Lutheran Development Service (LDS) of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Papua New Guinea initiated the project, supported by ELCA World Hunger, by first organizing a project committee with local leadership. LDS provided the material and a plumber, whereas the village provided the labor, contributed toward the cost of a vehicle to haul the material, and constructed a guesthouse.

Water taps at every home eliminate the need for people (usually children) to haul water from the stream every morning and afternoon for cooking, washing, and irrigation. Now children can get to school on time. All this has opened up other new opportunities.

Elsie Foyang is the pastor's daughter and an extension worker in the village. A better source of water offered her the opportunity to start a demonstration greenhouse, which has expanded into a business. She now has 12 farmers working for her, growing vegetable seedlings and producing chicken feed and fish feed. "With bad roads, especially when it rains, it's difficult to get feed materials from town," she says. "So we've created a process here, using some purchased feed, and combine this with ground-up cassava and other materials." These are pressed into small pellets and sun-dried.

Now villagers can grow vegetables to eat and sell at the market. They have a steady stream of feed for chickens and fish. Beyond this, other income-generating crops such as coffee and vanilla (which is labor intensive) have helped improve life. Frieda Wangon, one of the farmers, is proud of the certification she received for quality coffee beans. "With the extra cash income, I can pay my children's school fees and can buy various household materials," she said. "I also was able to contribute toward the water supply program." Wangon was able to build her own house and next wants to install solar power. "I used to live in poverty. Now I am more resilient, though I hope to move to more sustainability in income."
