Altar Guild Notes: November, 2025

The Saints come marching in on the first Sunday of November!

The sanctuary is dressed in white to remember the saints that have gone before us. Candles will help us do just that. Each bright flame lit to remember the light of Christ within a loved one then and now.

Green panels are added to the altar frontal for the following two Sundays.

They serve as a reminder we are still in the current liturgical season of Time after Pentecost.

The addition of harvest decorations also remind us of our current climate season of Autumn!

The fourth Sunday is the last Sunday of our liturgical year. The green panels are removed. The Autumnal decorations remain, but all traces of green are gone. We celebrate the festival of Christ the King this day. See the crown near the altar? Look closer. There is a crown of thorns too.

Now focus on the altar frontal. Our king's hands are not clenched around a scepter or resting on the arms of a throne. Our Savior King has His arms outstretched to envelop us all with love and mercy. Christ, with arms that were outstretched on a cross in death, rose again to bring us to eternal life with God.





One more Sunday this November! It's not over! But yes, it is! We are starting a new liturgical year in church! Advent begins!!

Yep, out comes the blue paraments. The Advent wreath is up front. Blue candles in the windows. We are waiting, preparing for Christ.

The seasons change outside. The seasons change inside church. What never changes is Christ's love and mercy.

Thankofferings: Giving Thanks to God, All Day, Every Day

The daily practice of giving thanks to God for blessings received is at the heart of our lives as people of faith. Even the ordinary blessings of daily life call us to gratitude. One way we do this is through our Thankoffering collection, which will take place on Sunday, November 16th. At St. Timothy, all are encouraged "to act boldly on their faith in Jesus Christ" by participating in this special collection.

Thankoffering was started by women in Lutheran churches more than one hundred years ago. Through the organization they established, they were able to do collectively what they could not do alone. By adding all their pennies and nickels together that they had gathered in thanks throughout the year, they were able to support a missionary or maybe build an orphanage.

Today, Thankofferings support the ministries of the Women of the ELCA such as justice and advocacy work, training and development for elected leaders, grants and scholarships that help women "to act boldly on their faith in Jesus Christ," and the many communications channels that support, encourage, and inform people to help them grow in their discipleship, among others. Through our Thankofferings, we show gratitude for God's blessings and support our partnership with God in making Christ known to all the world. We are called to offer with joy and gratitude what God has first given us.

Our Thanksgiving Ecumenical Service will once again include a collection for a local community organization. This will be announced as we get closer.

Conference Assembly News

After opening worship at the October 22 Conference Assembly...

Pr. Jeremiah Smith was reelected as Dean of our conference (Niagara Frontier.) He ran unopposed.

Two resolutions were passed and will be forwarded to the synod council. The council will check them to ensure they are legal and not in violation of the synod constitution. If the synod council considers both conditions to be met, the resolutions will be brought before the 2026 synod assembly for action. As with the conference assembly, St. Timothy is allowed to have the pastor and two members serve as voting representatives at the synod assembly.

The resolutions—in simplest terms are:

Resolution to set term limits for synod executive officers (excluding the office of bishop) to two consecutive full terms for the vice president and secretary, and three consecutive full terms for the treasurer. (There are conditions allowed when partial terms come into play.)

Resolution to encourage all congregations to adopt and implement safe supervision standards in youth and children's ministry. (The resolution is 8 pages long, so this is just the simplest, most basic version!)

Pr. Adam, and Phyllis & Duane Keeler attended as voting representatives of St. Timothy.

Because there was an election for the position of dean, Bishop Miller attended the meeting to run the election. After the business of the conference was completed, the bishop answered general questions.
