From the Pastor's Desk

Altar Guild Notes: January, 2024

The Christmas paraments still adorn the altar, lectern, pulpit. That is because Epiphany is on the pulpit panel. There they are, the 3 Magi (kings). Notice the gifts they bring for the divine infant King. Their sights were set on the light of the star guiding them to the light of the world. Then hearts (theirs & ours) were lit with the fire of the Holy Spirit.



Speaking of the Holy Spirit....we celebrate the Baptism of our Lord the day after Epiphany. A dove descends, a voice rings out, "This is my Son, the Beloved, with whom I am well pleased." Christ is revealed as the Son of God.

In one Sunday we have the light of the star, the infant Jesus, the adult Jesus. The Holy Spirit descending, God's voice proclaiming!


Last Month's Memories




Our Christmas Eve candlelight service was packed with people celebrating the mystery of the birth of Christ among us and was filled with special moments.
